Margot Frank – Anne's sister – beautiful and intelligent – quite sober, calm and quiet – good understanding – busy in learning new things – shares many traits with Anne – shows signs of maturity in the case of Peter – withdraws her love when she finds Anne in love with Peter – accepts her fate and does not complain to anyone

OR

Entered Cambridge school to prepare for the preliminary examination - Anne Sullivan - her long time teacher and helper attending Keller's classes - used the manual alphabet to share and teach her - helped Keller with the homework while reading books which were not available in Braille – Keller studied with a personal tutor - Mr. Gilman's broad views of History and Literature and his clever explanations also made Helen's work easier

OR

A tutor taught Helen Algebra, Geometry, Greek and Latin – went to Wentham twice a week to teach her – Sullivan interpreted his instruction to her – gave her lessons five times a week at Boston- explained everything until Helen understood – assigned and checked her work thoroughly – made Mathematics interesting for Helen – accompanied her to college – encouraged her to be alert - trained her to learn calmly and logically
